Lutheran World Relief: Making a Difference

As the name implies LWR operates all over the world. Their mission is affirming God's love for all people, working with Lutherans and partners around the world to end poverty, injustice and human suffering.

During 2015, LWR reached more than 4 million people in 36 countries through 126 projects with 104 partners.

Sources of funding comes from donated material resources, 28.3%; individuals, congregations and others, 35.2%; grants-U.S. government, 10.3%; grants-foundation, corporate and other, 7.9%; bequests, 6%; ELCA, 5%; action by churches together, 4.3%; LCMS, 1.3%; combined federal campaign, 1.3%; food resource bank, .6%.

Expenses allocated: Program services, 85.7%; management, 6.6%; fundraising, 7.7%.

A few of the programs initiated in 2015 include: Kenya and Uganda have experienced success

between coffee farmers and their cooperatives by special training and utilizing smart phones connected to agricultural databases regarding crop diseases, weather forecasts, herbicide training.

Columbian farmers have received training to increase coffee production by adopting sustainable farming practices where past conflict over land and water was prevalent.

A cacao seedling nursery in the Philippines was set up to provide start-up materials, facilities where farmers are able to learn techniques from start to finish in the cacao operation.

Families in the Sahel region of West Africa are helped through a livestock-sharing process and receiving drought-tolerant seeds and training on soil and water conservation.

In addition to many other programs, LWR gives excellent support during disasters around the world.

Luke's account of the mob at Ephesus in Acts 19

Acts 19 starts with Paul leaving Apollos in charge of the church in Corinth while he continues his missionary journey. It ends with Paul's encounter with an angry mob.

Upon his arrival in Ephesus, Paul meets some believers whose instruction was incomplete. He teaches them about the Holy Spirit and baptizes them in the name of the Lord Jesus. But then things get interesting.

Paul's message offends both Jewish and Gentile establishments in Ephesus. The response of some people in the synagogue was the usual: stubbornness and disbelief.

But for the Gentiles, the problem was literally closer to home: their pocketbooks. What Acts calls "a serious disturbance" broke out when a silversmith named Demetrius told his fellow silversmiths that Paul's ministry was bad for business.

To understand why, for centuries the city had

been a center for cult practices drawing worshipers to the magnificent temple of Artemis (425 feet long by 200 feet wide, four times the size of the Parthenon) which was considered one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. Those who came purchased replica shrines, mostly of silver. As Paul's converts abandoned their former worship, the silversmithing business fell off threatening their livelihood in addition to Ephesus' stature within the Roman Empire.

So the people of Ephesus rioted, yelling "Great is Artemis of the Ephesians." While two of Paul's companions were dragged into the theatre and threatened with bodily harm, Paul was kept from joining them by friends. The mob was finally quieted by the town clerk who warned the crowd that they were in danger of being charged with rioting. The merchants dispersed and the matter ended.
