The PASTOR'S PEN by Rev. Steve Bang

“Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift.” (II Cor. 9:15) Christmas is a time for gifts. Young and old enjoy the fulfillment and satisfaction found in gift giving and gift receiving. The tradition of Christmas gifts is rooted in the greatest Gift ever... the gift of a Savior... the Christmas Gift.

Jesus was the Perfect Gift – perfect, sinless, holy. He came to a sinful, unholy, imperfect world in order that He might bring the gift of salvation to all. “For by grace are you saved through faith and this is a gift from God, not of works, lest any man should boast.” (Eph. 2:8-9)

Jesus is a gift for all of us. He gave himself to us because he loves us. Ever given a gift to Jesus? What was it? After all, Christmas is a celebration of His birthday. Shouldn't we be giving Him something? What do you think Mary, the mother of Jesus, would think about the way we see gift giving today? Listen to this story called “Mary's Dream”:

“I had a dream, Joseph. I don't understand it, not really, but I think it was about a birthday celebration for our Son. I think that was what it was all about. The people had been preparing for it for about six weeks. They had decorated the house and bought new clothes. They'd gone shopping many times and bought elaborate gifts.

It was peculiar, though, because the presents weren't for our Son. They wrapped them in beautiful paper and tied them with lovely bows and

There’s the aroma of fresh-
ly baked specialties that
also signal traditions, as
well as bringing out hand-
ed-down decorations.

your family grows?

My favorite tradition as
a child was having our
Sunday School program on
Christmas Eve. At the
close of service, we each
received a little brown bag
that held peanuts, some
hard candies and especial-
ly the Delicious apple.
Throughout the years, we
have incorporated tradi-
tions from our respective
relatives and making new
traditions.

According to tradition, it
is said that Mary was told
on March 25th (the An-
nunciation) she would con-
ceive and deliver a special
child. On December 25th

— the greatest Christmas
gift for all mankind was
delivered. This day is ob-
served worldwide!

The lore of the candy
cane became a Christmas
tradition — the J for Je-
sus, the white stripe for
His purity, and the red
stripe for the blood He
shed when He died on the
cross.

The tradition of the hol-
ly brings to mind the
prickly leaves that repre-
sent the crown of thorns
and the berries symbolize
the drops of blood caused
by the thorns.

Ivy is also a reminder,
just as the plant needs
