

February 8, 2017 Council Minutes

President Jan Reimann called the meeting to order. Present were Jan, Julie, Phyllis, Lanette, Lisa, Wendell and Pastor Steve. Absent were Bill Schutter and Carol Carson. Julie gave devotions. Ceara Fjeld will be going on a veterinary mission trip from Iowa State to Nicaragua. She is asking for support, either financial or prayer. Phyllis moved, Julie seconded that West Prairie give her \$400 for her trip. Motion carried.

We have received two bids for mowing- J&B is \$150 a time with trimming every other time, and Ackermann's being \$130 a time with trimming the same. We decided to table this for further discussion.

We discussed the pew cushions. They are getting really thin and worn out. Zion just got new cushions. It was suggested that we talk to them so we can find out where they got theirs.

We are going to update the scholarship rules to be more specific. One of the rules already states that the applicant be an active church member. Our next meeting is Tuesday, March 14. Since Lenten services are on Wednesday we will change to Tuesday. Wendell moved, Phyllis seconded, motion carried to adjourn the meeting. We closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Greetings!

Lent marks the 40 day period before Easter that begins each year on Ash Wednesday (March 1 this year). Although it is traditionally a time devoted to self-examination, self-denial, and repentance, Lent sinks its deepest roots into the joyful expectation of new life through God's forgiveness and steadfast love. Lent issues a call to God's people to return to Him with their whole heart. It is a time to take seriously the areas of our lives in which we fall short, feel defeated, or have grown cold. And we do so not to beat ourselves up but to prepare for God's gifts.

Every gift from God reveals His love but no gift reveals His love more than the gifts of the cross. These gifts came not wrapped in paper but in passion. They were not placed around a tree but around a cross. They were not covered with ribbons but sprinkled with the blood that Jesus shed on our behalf.

The hill of Calvary is rich with the gifts of God's grace. These were gifts He didn't have to give. These include not only the gift of the cross but also the gift of thorns that pierced His brow, the nails that tore His flesh, the seamless robe that He removed for us, the empty tomb where He forever defeated sin and death. The cross is rich with God's gifts of grace and as we unwrap them, we will hear Him whisper, "I did it just for you."

Our Saviors provides service to those in need

As part of the Our Saviors Food Pantry “team,” I’d like to provide some information about operating procedures and what we’re all about.

Our Saviors pantry is open every Tuesday from 4:30-6:30 p.m. or when there is a food emergency. Clients can receive food twice a month and we focus mainly on Winnebago County residents, but are open to anyone in need. Recipients are allowed to make food choices hopefully eliminating waste.

A committee of six volunteers handle details of running the pantry. Some do the ordering, others pick up food orders, stock shelves, keep an inventory of food items in stock, purchase food, and unload deliveries. Another 20 volunteers work on a rotating schedule on Tuesdays during the pantry’s open hours.

The Pantry operates with donations from individuals and churches and with grants. It’s been a blessing to partner with the food bank of Iowa in Des Moines. Food orders are either picked up in Des Moines or delivered to Clear Lake for pickup.

Thanksgiving dinners were provided to 53 families and 46 families received Christmas dinners in 2016.

St. Patrick, is he fact or myth?
